Town of Madawaska PROCLAMATION

Whereas Pierre Cyr established the Cyr name upon the North American Continent in the year of our Lord 1668, and

Whereas his descendent Jean Baptiste Cyr and his nine sons traveled to the shores of the St. John River in 1785, and

Whereas his descendants have established themselves over the entire North American Continent and

Whereas their efforts and sacrifices contributed greatly to the early development of this Community, and

Whereas many of the Cyrs have distinguished themselves in public service not only in this Municipality but throughout the entire Nation as well, and

Whereas these same descendants have organized in order to hold a Reunion at Madawaska in the State of Maine, the seat of the first Cyrs to be established in these United States, and

Whereas this Celebration will be held in Madawaska on the 24th, 25th, and 26th days of July in the year of our Lord 1981

Be it therefore resolved that we, the Selectmen of Madawaska do declare the 24th, 25th, and 26th days of July, 1981 to be known as the Cyr Reunion in this Community and that said Reunion is a time for Celebration and renewal of acquaintances and friendships.

We therefore have caused this document to be duly signed in our presence and proclaim the Cyr Reunion throughout the land, and resolve that it be incumbent upon future generations to do likewise.

Cyr & Cyr Root Family Reunion

Dear cousins,

It is with pleasure and honor to invite you to the CYR & CYR Root Family Reunion being sponsored by the Madawaska Historical Society on July 24, 25, and 26, 1981.

If anything typifies family unity, it is the story of the nine CYR brothers who pioneered the Madawaska settlement in 1785. Born in colonial Acadia before the French and Indian Wars, they survived their war refuge fate which saw them dispersed in the Canadian forest. After the Treaty of Paris, they left the Province of Quebec to return to their native Acadia. From Crock's Point near Fredericton, N.B., they joined together in one last migration and settled together in Madawaska on the upper St. John where they carved a new life and home.

We wish to invite you to join us in this celebration. We seek your assistance in helping us locate all CYR & CYR root family members by sending us a list of names and addresses of your brothers/sisters or of any relatives having Cyr descendants so we may be assured that all have been contacted and invited to our family reunion.

We hope you will find time in your busy schedule to join us in our family celebration. Let us all be proud of our culture and heritage. Come and meet many of your family members along with having an enjoyable time together.

Enclosed you will find the following: (1) tentative schedule of activities for the CYR & CYR Root Family Reunion; (2) list of motel/hotel accommodations and camping areas available.

We will accept any donations to help us defray cost of expenses. We would also appreciate it if you would give us an idea if your attendance will be possible.

The CYR'S of the St. John Valley extend a cordial invitation to one and all to attend this celebration with them.

Nous avons le plaisir et l'honneur de vous inviter à la réunion des familles CYR et de leur parenté consanguine. C'est à dire que si votre mère était une demoiselle CYR, vous êtes invités, même si vous portez un autre nom. Cette célébration, organisée par la société historique de Madawaska, aura lieu les 24, 25, et 26 juillet, 1981.

L'histoire des neuf frères CYR qui ont fondé l'établissement de Madawaska, en 1785, est un exemple typique d'unité familiale. De Crock's Point près de Fredericton, au Nouveau-Brunswick, ils s'unirent en une dernière grande migration et s'établirent ensemble au Madawaska, en haut de la rivière Saint-Jean, où ils se firent une nouvelle vie et une demeure permanente.

PIERRE CYR - MARIE BOURGEOIS

The origins of Pierre Cyr are to us somewhat obscure. Unverified references point to Touraine-en-Loire, France. An equally unsubstantiated source makes mention of St. Germaine de Bourgeuil near Orleans in the French province of Touraine. It remains to French genealogists to work this out. In any case the young Pierre Cyr appears on the Acadian scene in 1668. Two years later he married the seventeen year old Marie Bourgeois at Port Royal, Acadie (Annapolis Royal, Nova Scotia today). She was the daughter of the former post surgeon under Governor d'Aulnay. Jacques Bourgeois, her father appears to have developed a sizeable estate. Laurant Molin's census of Acadie in 1671 begins with the Bourgeois family. His holdings at the time were said to include 33 head of cattle, two dozen sheep, a pair of oxen and five acres of land under tillage. The livestock holdings of twenty-seven year old Pierre Cyr, on the other hand were considerably smaller. He is listed as owning but one cow, two sows and six sheep. (Massignon, p.944)

Shortly after 1671, Jacques Bourgeois, who also engaged in fur trading, moved his family up the Bay of Fundy to Cumberland Basin which the Indians called Chignecto. With the move, Bourgeois was accompanied by his three sons-in law, Pierre Cyr, Germaine Girouard, and Jean Boudrot. Shortly thereafter, Michel Le Neuf, a Quebecois aristocrat was granted a seigneurie in the area. It was he who renamed the Bourgeois settlement, Beaubassin. (Clarke p. 141) We might surmise, Pierre Cyr may well have worked in his father in law's grist mill and saw mill which he later erected at Beaubassin.

The Cyr's became the parents of three sons. Jean the eldest, born in 1671 later married Francoise Melanson whose father is said to have been of Scottish origin. It appears the Melansons may have arrived in Acadia during the English interregnum which saw Robert Sedgwick take over the county in 1654 or Thomas Temple's arrival in 1657. (Arsenault p.57). Jean, through his grandsons became the grand patriarch of the Cyr's of Madawaska.

The other two sons were Pierre b. 1677, and Guillaume b. 1679. Pierre's descendants ended up at St. Sevran de St. Malo, France during the era of Le Grand Derangement though later we find some family members in the province of Quebec.

Guillaume's family on the other hand ended up in Boston and after the war, we find his widow at Miquelon, a French island of the coast of northern Quebec.

Pierre Cyr, the family progenitor allegedly died at Beaubassin, Acadia circa 1678-79. At the census of 1680, we find his young widow to have remarried to Germain Girouard, who as noted had figured among Jacques Bourgeois's sons in law. Pierre's widow gave birth to three other children with her husband, Girouard whom she had married at Beaubassin on June 9, 1680. In 1686 she was a widow again and left with five children, the oldest being fifteen.

At the census of 1680, her three sons by first marriage were listed under the name "Cire". Old documents use several spellings for the family name, including: Cire, Cyre, Sir, Sire, and Cyr. (Massignon p. 50)

Marie Bourgeois, the mother of the Cyr family of North America, lived to a ripe old age. Her death certificate, registered at Beaubassin, March 3, 1741 gives her as being then eighty-eight years old. The aging document notes the presence of her sons Jean Cyre, and Pierre at the burial.

JEAN CYR - FRANCOISE MELANSON

When Rev. Laurant Moin took the first census in Acadia, Jean Cyr, son of Pierre Cyr and Marie Bourgeois was but three months old. Thus despite our lack of a birth record, we can safely assume that Jean Cyr was born in 1671. He appears to have been born at Port Royal, the original Acadian settlement whose history dates back to 1605. While yet an infant the family took him to Beaubassin where his maternal grandfather pioneered a new settlement. Somewhere around 1692, young Jean Cyr married Francoise Melanson, the daughter of Charles Melanson, a Scotsman, and his French wife, Marie Dugas. They eventually had five sons and four daughters who lived through that migratory period of Acadian history known as "Le Grand Derangement".

Marriage records pertaining to their children indicate that Jean Cyr continued to reside at Beaubassin at the head of Chignecto Bay for the rest of his life. It is there at Beaubassin where on June 12, 1720 the missionary noted the passing of "Jean Sire, epoux de Francoise Millancon".

"ACADIAN FESTIVAL 1981"

The beautiful, sunny Sunday of June 28, 1981 will long be remembered by those who were part of it.

Nearly 500 people attended a French Mass in honor of the Acadian settlers in the Madawaska territory at the St. David Church. The Mass was co-celebrated by Rev. Leopold Nicknair, Paster of St. Louis Catholic Church at Fort Kent and Rev. Laurent Cyr of Texas.

Following the Mass, the congregation took part in a procession to the Acadian Cross landing site. Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus carried 25 flags from different places that had somehow affected the lives of the Acadians throughout their history in North America.

Members of the Cyr family crossed the St. John River in six canoes re-enacting the arrival of the first settlers in 1785. They were greeted on the shore by a large crowd of well wishers including a delegation of Malecite Indians from the St. Basile and Tobique Reserves. A ceremony including smoking the traditional peace pipe and dancing at the foot of the cross took place.

After the recitation of the Angelus, descendents of the 16 founding families placed wreaths at the foot of the cross in memory of these valiant pioneers. No Acadian celebration would be complete without singing Evangeline and Madawaska Douce Patrie. Conrad Daigle's rendition brought tears and goose pimples to many bystanders.

The festivity ended with a picnic lunch where everyone had a chance to reminisce and share "leur joie de vivre".

URGENT APPEAL

To All Society Members and Interested Citizens:

SECRETARY'S ANNUAL REPORT TO THE MEMBERSHIP

January, 1981

Acadian Family Reunion for the Cyr Family was made official. Bert Cyr accepted chairmanship of the reunion committee. Gabriel Dugal accepted the position as Liaison for the Society with the Cyr committee.

A motion was made for the Society to contribute to a library memorial for Dr. Grindle at the University of Maine at Fort Kent.

March 15, 1981

Board of Director, President Claude L. Cyr briefed the members on the Cyr Family Reunion. Chairman nominated was Claude Cyr, Secretary and Treas., Marie-Anne Cyr.

April 23, 1981

A request was brought up for \$4,000.00 to be presented to the Board of Selectmen. The amount is to be placed on the warrant to be voted at the annual town meeting. The program for Acadian Day and Cyr mass was discussed. Cecile Pozzuto took the chairmanship of the Acadian Day activities. Cecile also agreed to remain Society Clerk.

May 25, 1981

Don Cyr reported on Cyr Family Reunion. He set meetings with Chamber of Commerce and Lioness. It was agreed to sponsor the Cyr Family Reunion regardless of the date the Cyr Family decided. A letter was read by Claude Cyr, written by Norman Cyr. The letter of invitation will be mailed to approximately 2,000 Cyr families in both the U. S. and Canada. Mrs. Oneil D. Cyr will design the Cyr family crest and banner. Mr. Edward Cyr donated a \$100.00 bond for a door prize.

June , 1981

Cecile Pozzuto, chairman of the Society's Acadian Day activities, gave final details as to the planned activities. Photo albums, compiled to date, were on display.

June 15, 1981

Details of the mass at the St. David Church, honoring the Cyr Family, was formalized. Fifteen letters of invitations to the mass had been sent to dignitaries. Directors dressed in costumes are to act as hostesses during the mass. Bernette, Rolande, Geraldine and Fernande were designated as receptionists. Mass programs were printed at a cost of \$40.00. President, Claude L. Cyr announced that the \$4,000.00 from the town of Madawaska had been received and the Society's treasurer, Msgr. Chalout had placed the money in the Society's treasury.

Nov., 1981

Treasurer's report, \$6,755.31 as of October 31. Claude Cyr gave a report on the Cyr Family Reunion. A sum of \$26,417.89 was listed as the total income. \$3,016.36 would be applied to publishing the Cyr book. The reserve will go to the next reunion and toward the Shrine. Over \$1,000.00 in books were presold. Bernette Albert gave a report on the Memorial Shrine. The cost of this project will be approximately \$11,484.00. This shrine is marble. Geraldine Chasse has been appointed to the Maine League of Historical Societies. Congratulations! The Society decided to sponsor the Hebert Family for 1982. Guy Dubay gave an update on the exhibit development at the State Museum. A project of constructing a sign for the front of the Tante Blanche Museum was mentioned. Fern Dube and Bernette were examining different ideas on this project. Date for next meeting-Sunday, Dec. 6th.

At the 13th Annual Membership Meeting, President, Claude L. Cyr thanked all who have contributed and sponsored activities during the Cyr festivities. Guy Dubay thanked the outgoing officers for their services. The slate of officers for the coming year are as follows: Pres., Claude L. Cyr; V. Pres., Bernette Albert; Treas., Msgr. G. Chalout; Sec., Warrenna Morin; Directors: Marie May Caron, Donald Cyr, Gabriel Dugal, Rolande Levesque, Fernand Dube, Bert Cyr, and Ben Talbot.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

One of the yearly joys of the Society is to report its accomplishments to the membership.

There is no doubt this past year that the Cyr Family Reunion was the utmost of achievements. The Cyrs arrived "en masse" to our proud town from all over the United States and Canada, plus a couple of foreign countries. Mostly all businesses in town and the surrounding towns felt the impact.

From a cultural and historical viewpoint, it seems that they could not get enough history and genealogy, even though the three-day event was focused on those two aspects almost exclusively. The Mass at the foot of the Acadian Cross and the symbolic river crossing enchanted everyone. No "good-byes" were said at the end of the event. Only, "see you in '85" was smilingly uttered as they departed. It seems that 1985, the bicentennial of the Acadian landing, is a milestone with the visiting Cyrs as much as it is with all of us. The devoted Cyr Family Reunion committees achieved a superb success!

Madawaska was a proud town during both the Cyr Family Reunion and Acadian Day. Again, the highly favored symbolic river crossing was enacted. It was a humble moment when, finally, we were able to acknowledge some gratitude to our beloved Malecite friends who crossed the river to share the common historical values we cannot afford to ignore.

During the remainder of the year, the Society continued work on the Albert homestead and maintained the usual Tante Blanche Museum complex operations throughout the summer. Visitor statistics soared to over 6,000 due to the two big events noted above. During the year, planning was also continued on our most favorite project of all; namely, the construction of the permanent Acadian Cross by 1985. A model has been constructed by a Society member and is on display at the Museum. Also, another Society member prepared a beautiful pictorial history of the American Legion Post of Madawaska. It is on display at the Post home.

Again, your continued support is deeply appreciated. Without it, the preservation of our cherished history would be impossible.

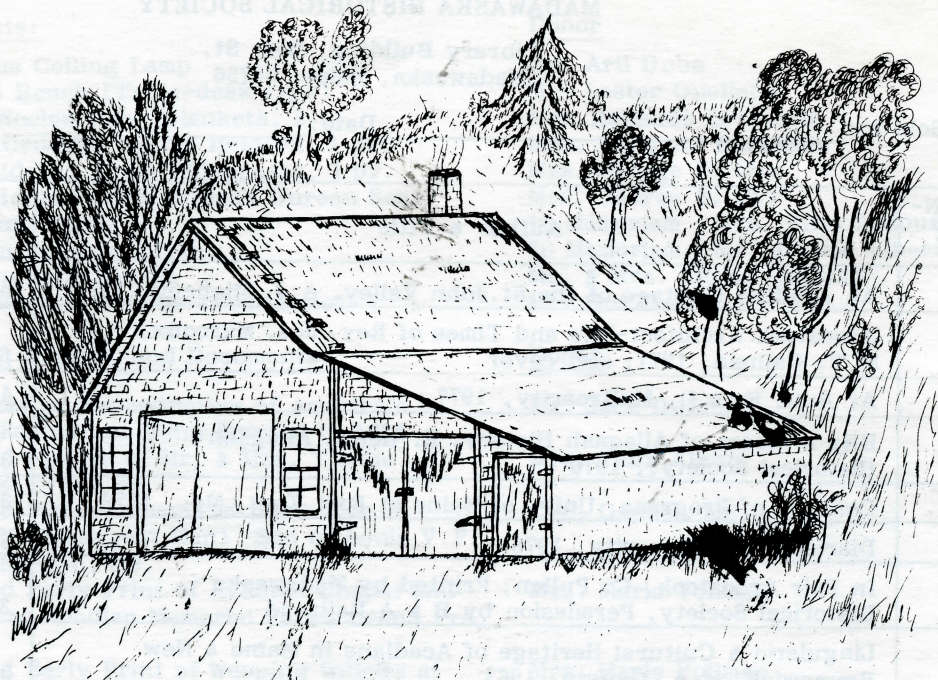
