Many residents of St. Francis attended Mass at this Baptist church in St. Francois, New Brunswick, in 1888 long before any church was established on the American side.



This is a parcel of property located on the flat land behind what was once Parish Hall in St. Francis. Monique Jandreau now has residence over the property, part of which was once a cemetery.







#### Four portraits of Albert family 'come back home'

Renaud Albert and Bernette Albert, long-time philanthropists to the Madawaska Historical Society, have allowed antique portraits of their great-grandparents, Luc Albert (1818-1888) and Eulalie Violette-Albert, and their grandparents, Eloi Albert (1850-1924) and Delina Dufour-Albert, to "come back home" through a June 25 portrait donation to MHS. The two donated four 19th-century-style, hand-etched portraits

to the Albert House museum, which has been set behind the Tante Blanche Museum on the Acadian Cross and Landing Road for the past 40 years. Its last occupant and resident, Fred Albert, died in 1970. The 1850 U.S. Census record of its occupants shows 13 people residing in the old house, according to Guy Dubay, seasonal museum curator.







#### **LOOKING BACK: Clair House, 1910**

The Clair House was built in 1898 by Thomas Clair of Clair, New Brunswick. His son James, then 12, helped build it, according to family members Peter and Marielle Clair of Clair. The hotel had 18 rooms and two bathrooms. The exterior, seen here in 1910, was covered with pine boards from Columbia. The hotel became the property of Isidore Albert in 1911, then of Roland Albert and his wife in 1933 and of Éva Albert in 1945. The subsequent buyer, Willie Pinette, named it Riverview Inn. The municipality bought it in 1973 and tore it down three years later to build the Clair Municipal Building.



#### LOOKING BACK: Edmundston

This was the first Customs station on the Canadian side of the Madawaska / Edmundston border, according to Ray Shearer of Edmundston, New Brunswick. The photo most likely dates back to the late 1930s or early 1940s, said Shearer. The current Custom's building in Edmundston opened in February 1993. Shearer pointed out that an older flag, with the Union Jack, is evident in this photo, as Canada only received its own flag in 1965.




#### St. Agatha, 1981

The Romeo Chasse farm homestead on Flat Mountain belonged to Flevrin Picard in 1890 when he bought the land from the state of Maine for \$12. 



#### Fort Kent-Clair footbridge, 1910

A suspension footbridge linked Fort Kent with Clair, New Brunswick around 1910. The approximately 13-meter bridge was built by Clair resident Joseph R. Long, husband of Alphonsine Bérubé, according to information from the Clair family. He began construction during the winter of 1902-1903, putting up cables and then building the walkway the following summer. The bridge was used about nine months each year until the ice was solid. The total cost of the bridge was around \$20,000. Pedestrians paid a five-cent toll each way.


















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

Some things stay the same, however, such as schools needing teachers and children enjoying the spring weather.












